Executive Summary



Background and Purpose

According to a recent survey by the New Orleans Crime Coalition:

- 64% of Orleans Parish residents feel the city is not safe
- 74% feel the crime problem in the city has worsened over the last year
- <u>78%</u> feel that crime/public safety are the most important (~56%) or second-most important (~23%) issues currently facing the city
- <u>90%</u> support increasing NOPD manpower to help combat the crime problems in the city

This report provides an in-depth comparison of major categories of violent crime – <u>Homicide</u>, <u>Shooting</u>, <u>Carjacking</u>, & <u>Armed Robbery</u> – for the first six months of 2019, 2020, and 2021

Mapped locations of year-to-date (YTD) reported violent crime provide a visual depiction of where violent incidents occurred across the city

It is our hope that sharing crime mapping information will facilitate greater citizen awareness, engagement, and support of law enforcement efforts to mitigate crime

Findings

The crime maps and data presented herein clearly support the public's viewpoint that crime has worsened over the last few years

Citywide violent incidents in the first six months of 2021 increased 53% compared with the same time frame in 2019 and 47% compared with the same time period in 2020

The 7th District and 5th Districts consistently accounted for nearly 50% of all January-June violent felony incidents

While the number of violent crime incidents increased throughout the city, the relative proportion of violent crime in each district was relatively stable (see **Exhibit 1**)

Recommendations



Our findings have documented a two-year cycle of unacceptably high – and escalating – violent crime patterns in each of the eight NOPD districts. Based on our findings, the MCC respectfully recommends implementing and/or allocating additional funds towards the following strategies to address and mitigate the rampant violent crime problems gripping our community:

1. <u>Increase NOPD staffing, particularly in "hot spot" areas of concern</u> (NOCC survey: 90% favorable)

The NOPD is facing an historic, 50-year low number of officers, currently hovering around 1,100, with more leaving the department every month

Current levels of NOPD staffing are inadequate to respond to calls for service and the surging violent crime plaguing the city

The MCC recommends funding police pay raises to meet a hiring goal of at least 1,450 NOPD officers. These raises will provide incentives to aid in recruitment and retention efforts

2. Authorize and prioritize the constitutional use of data and technology (NOCC survey: 88% favorable)

Tools such as electronic monitoring of released arrested subjects, facial recognition technology, crime cameras, license plate readers, and enhanced access to DNA testing and analysis, will serve as a force multiplier and provide police with the resources necessary to aid in crime prevention and investigations

- <u>Number/location of incidents are approximate.</u> This data represents unofficial counts of violent incidents, as reported in the NOPD's Calls for Service database

- Charts depict the number of major violent crime reports for each NOPD police district for the first six months (January 1-June 30) of 2019, 2020, and 2021
- Charts are displayed in rank-order, from lowest to highest based on the number of major violent incidents
- Each district is color-coded according to the legend on the right



2019-2021 Major Violent Crime Trends

Citywide violent incidents in the first six months of 2021 increased 53% compared with the same time frame in 2019 and 47% compared with the same time period in 2020

The 7th District and 5th District consistently had the two highest rates of major violent crime in the first six months of each year, accounting for nearly 50% of all January-June violent felony incidents, respectively

While violent crime increased throughout the city, the relative proportion of violent crime in each district was relatively stable

<u>2019-2021</u>

Compared with 2019, the 3rd District had the largest (150%) increase in major violent crime in 2021. This increase was largely driven by a significant spike in 3rd District carjacking

Although no district showed a decline in violent crime compared with 2019, the 8th District had the smallest (13%) increase in major violent crime in 2021, likely due to restrictions on gatherings resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic

<u>2020-2021</u>

Compared with 2020, the 8th District had the largest (136%) increase in major violent crime in 2021, likely due to easing of COVID-19 restrictions

When compared with the same time frame in 2020, the 2nd District decreased 16% and the 4th District decreased 2% in overall major violent crime incidents






Citywide homicide in the first six months of 2021 was 27% higher than the first six months of 2020 and 48% higher than the first six months of 2019


The 1st District has shown the highest (67%) increase in homicide from 2020 to 2021, largely within the Treme/Lafitte neighborhood

The 5th District has shown a 65% increase from 2020 to 2021, with clusters seen in the St. Roch, St. Claude, and Lower Ninth Ward neighborhoods

The 7th District has shown a 50% increase from 2020 to 2021, particularly in the Pines Village, Little Woods, and West Lake Forest neighborhoods




Citywide shootings in the first six months of 2021 were 64% higher compared with 2020 and 110% higher compared with 2019. In the first six months of 2021, the 7th and 5th Districts accounted for 52% of shootings citywide

The 8th District had the highest (450%) increase in shootings from 2020 to 2021, with a striking rise in French Quarter shooting incidents

The 1st District increased 173%, from 2020 to 2021, with notable clusters in the Tulane/Gravier, Treme, and Seventh Ward neighborhoods

The 3rd District increased 125% from 2020 to 2021. This increase was most prominent in the Gentilly and Fairgrounds areas


Orleans Parish Three-Year Aggregated Carjacking by District


Carjacking incidents increased 101% citywide compared to the first six months of 2020, and 180% compared to the same time frame in 2019

The 7th District accounts for over a third (38%) of carjacking totals citywide

5th District carjacking increased 233% from 2020 to 2021, with higher concentrations in the Bywater, St. Claude, and Marigny neighborhoods

3rd District carjacking increased 121% from 2020 to 2021, particularly in the Gentilly area

1st District carjacking increased 113% from 2020 to 2021, largely in Seventh Ward, Treme, and Bayou St. John neighborhoods



Citywide, armed robbery declined 22% from 2019-2020, likely due to lack of opportunity, as the COVID-19 shutdown effectively emptied the streets for months.

Armed robberies are nearing pre-pandemic levels in some areas as restrictions are lifted, but 2021 remains 6% lower than the same time in 2019


Notable year-to-year increases from 2020-2021 include:

4th District increased 100%, along Gen. DeGaulle in Algiers


8th District increased 77%, largely along Canal St. in and around the French Quarter

7th District increased 43%, with clusters in the Plum Orchard, Little Woods, & Pines Village neighborhoods

<u>Decreases from 2020-2021</u> include a 28% reduction in the 3rd District and a 14% reduction in the 1st District
